

Choice Neighborhoods Initiative Act

The Choice Neighborhoods program is a transformative grant program that converts severely distressed neighborhoods into high-quality, mixed-use community developments. Established in 2010, the program has provided \$1.8 billion in competitive grants to localities and community organizations for comprehensive neighborhood redevelopment across dozens of distressed communities.¹

At a time when the United States faces a housing affordability crisis, the Choice Neighborhoods program has successfully contributed to over 21,000 new housing units across 52 communities.² Much of the program's success is due to its ability to attract additional public and private dollars — nearly \$8 in additional leverage is raised for each dollar of Choice Neighborhoods funds spent.³ Communities across the country are ready to convert distressed neighborhoods into tens of thousands of high-quality, affordable housing units built by public-private partnerships. Over 130 communities have already received planning grants⁴ — additional Choice Neighborhood funds could transform these communities forever.

The Choice Neighborhoods Initiative Act:

- Permanently authorizes and expands the Choice Neighborhoods program.
- Codifies and builds on previous grant requirements including maintaining neighborhood affordability for at least 50 years, one-for-one replacement of housing units, and protections against resident displacement.
- Expands eligibility to include HUD-assisted housing that supports seniors and low-income people with disabilities.
- Ensures that a portion of grant funds can be used to expand supportive services, including educational development and job training programs, and rehabilitate community facilities.
- Has the potential to rapidly expand the national stock of affordable housing while improving the health, education, and employment outcomes for those living in distressed public housing.
